And if an answer sounds dubious, I will always try the same question with another AI model. So it is a great research tool, but I don't want it to write for me. It doesn't write in my style. It doesn't think like me.

This ability to write well, persuasively, is a double edged sword for society. People may well use this tool to do their schoolwork, which is, I think, a significant misuse, but even more ominously, can it be used to manipulate people, to write convincing, subversive racist tracts? Can it make advertising more effective? Can it appear to be providing truth while spouting lies?

To see what it does for writing, I will put the above short piece through the ChatGPT application and see if it makes it better, more readable, more succinct, more clear.
